This Lent we will spend five weeks with Flannery O'Connor, by reading a selection of her stories from *The Complete Stories of Flannery O'Connor*. Stories rife with human folly and moral snobbery will hold a mirror up to our faces as we are challenged by our own reflections and the distant, but clear glare of God's grace. Groups will begin to meet the first full week in Lent at different times throughout each week. Each group will have a facilitator to help guide

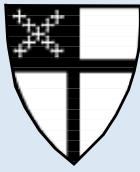
our thoughts as we read the stories.

My Sabbatical Quest for Narrative Leadership

When you read this, my sabbatical, with its focus on the study and practice of narrative leadership, will be underway. Narrative Leadership is a shared activity among leaders of a congregation that encourages the use of storytelling to build commitment to the congregation's mission. Telling and listening to these stories helps people know where the faith community has been and provides clues to where God is leading.

Because life has a narrative quality, we are able to transmit values, shape and reshape community life, and heal family fractures through the use of storytelling. The sacred text that we build our life around is a series of stories from the Garden of Eden through the early communities that formed themselves around the life of the risen Christ.

Most congregations know the local texture of their history and understand the power of stories, especially when they are told in sermons, vestry retreats, newcomer welcome brunches, Sunday schools, and leadership training. Behind every pew, font, and Sunday school door lie a host of stories waiting to be unlocked as resources for belonging and hope. This is where narrative leadership can be most powerful, helping people and their congregations embrace their



stories, ripe with new possibility and direction for the future.

Of course, part of telling stories is being a careful listener; bringing out the stories of each

parishioner and those of people in the surrounding community. There are churches across the country using that approach. For example, Broadway United Methodist church in Indianapolis has listened to stories from outside its congregation. One young woman, Maya, told a story of starting her own small tutoring program. The pastor brought her to church, told her story, and asked those who would help Maya to stand. The whole church stood and Broadway United has been running a tutoring program ever since.

I might sound like I know what I am talking about here, but there is still much to explore. I appreciate the vestry, parish, and staff for allowing me the time to investigate something that has intrigued me for years. I will miss being with you all, but trust your own practice of Sabbath will bring you renewal and a new sense of direction.

require that a candidate for vestry be 16-years old or older, and a member in good standing, which means faithfulness in worship, service, and financial support of the church through giving to the spread of God's kingdom. Individuals should offer demonstrated leadership abilities; have the ability to view the church as a whole; the desire to review the effectiveness of church policies and ministry programs; interest in collaborating with the rector and staff on ministry goals; commitment to the mission of Christ Church; and the willingness to accept God's call to serve.

The vestry is also responsible for the stewardship and financial management of the parish and the care of the physical campus. A variety of skills and working backgrounds is necessary for a strong vestry, as well as a balance among the members in age, gender, ethnicity, and length of parish membership.

Deadline for Nominations is February 14. If you know of someone who fits this description or if you yourself are called to serve, please submit a nomination form, which will be available from February 1-14 at services and at the parish office. The Nominating Committee will review submissions and propose a slate of candidates at the Annual Meeting on May 2. Ballot Sunday will be May 16.

Children of Chernobyl Effort Shifts to Ukraine

For more than 15 years, the Children of Chernobyl mission at Christ Church brought children ages 8-12 from the radiated areas of Belarus each summer for a six-week health respite. Our mission work has been complicated by political tensions between the U.S. and Belarus, and last summer we hoped in vain for a resolution to the political impasse that prevented more than 2,000 Belarusian children from coming to the United States.

As disappointing as it was for our host families, the cancellation was devastating for our Belarusian children and families, who rely on the winter clothes and pharmaceuticals we send back with the children each summer. Please keep them in your prayers this cold winter, particularly

as Russia plays havoc with gas delivery to Belarus.

Challenges also bring new opportunities and the need to adapt to changing circumstances has led to some exciting new directions for our mission. In lieu of bringing children to the U.S., we were able to support orphaned and disabled children in Belarus and cover the costs of several corrective eye surgeries at the Rudensk Orphanage.

Now, we are eagerly moving forward with plans to bring Ukrainian children for health respites from mid-June to the end of July in 2010. Christ Church will once again partner with St. John's Lutheran and between the two churches, we expect to bring 18-20 children to Northern Virginia.

We will work with the Boyarka Center in the small town of Boyarka near Kiev. The center is one of five founded by the UN after the 1986 Chernobyl disaster. It is supported by the Ukrainian government and a U.S.-based aid organization (FOCUSS), and offers programs for more than 10,000 children and their families coping with the effects from Chernobyl exposure.

We invite you to get involved in our mission. We have space to host two more children (for three or six weeks), and we are looking for families to host the chaperone and translator who accompany the children. HONDURAS STORIES: GOD'S GRACE REVEALED IN SMALL PIECES

We marked our first Thanksgiving Day in Honduras with a four-day visit from daughter, Liz, and special friend, Sarah DeCamps. Joined by North American missionary friends, we enjoyed a traditional meal of turkey and dressing, including a tasty Honduran version of pumpkin pie. Later in the evening, a quiet family conversation about our work here uncovered the many extraordinary ways in which God's grace had touched us in our very short time in Honduras.

In the Face of the Troubles

Since late June's ouster of Honduran President Zelaya, the troubles have

beset the St. Mary's family with fear and uncertainty. Weekly occurrences of violent demonstrations, vandalism, arson, looting, murders, and resulting curfews and suspension of classes have heightened and sustained everyone's feelings of anxiety and dread. In anticipation of national elections at the end of the month, students planning the upper school chapel for the first week of November asked Ron to read from the BCP the prayer For Sound Government. Following the chapel service a number of colleagues and students commented on how they had been uplifted and moved by the prayer. God's grace moved through us to quiet fears, ennoble the presidential election process, and encourage voting.

Our Thankful Tree

Led by Linda's nine first graders, the primary grades designed and developed a wall-mounted *thankful tree* on which the children placed the
